Temple Welcomes a New President

I have some good news and some bad news to share.

The good news is that the Board and Rabbi Schadick have entered into a new contract for the next three years. His new contract will begin July 1 and run through June 30, 2019.

The bad news is that with the state of Temple's finances, Rabbi Schadick has agreed to a significant cut in pay and benefits for the next three years. This is bad news for the Rabbi, his family and our congregation. While the Temple has been witnessing an ever decreasing contribution base. It has reached a point that our finances are having a certain and negative impact on our community.

For most of last year, we ran at a deficit, essentially operating from "donation to donation" as dues trickled in. We were bracing for a budget shortfall of about \$15,000. Thankfully, with the spectacular turnout at the Gala this year, we were able to fill the budget gap by raising an astounding \$20,000 at the eleventh hour. Many thanks to Rick Rinzler and everyone who attended or contributed.

The Board was in a difficult position. The Temple's operating budget are fixed expenses. Rather than run the risk of having a shortfall that could mean missing payroll or not being able to pay our electric bill, the Board made the painful, but fiscally responsible, decision to ask Rabbi to agree to a reduction in pay and benefits. Rabbi agreed. A sacrifice that would only be made by someone who really cares about this community. It is also a sign that things need to change.

The Board's priority this year is to stabilize the Temple's finances and

improve community engagement. I have received dozens and dozens of suggestions, comments, and concerns from the community over the past year as President-Elect. Some of the goals the Board will accomplish this year are:

1. Improve communication between the Board and the Congregation
2. Improve how the Board raises funds for Temple's operating budget
3. Improve Board transparency, and
4. Improve communication and relationship building among all congregants

My monthly reports will focus on what the Board is considering and how it is working to accomplish these goals.

The immediate task for the Operating Committee and Temple Board is to set the Temple's budget for the fiscal year starting July 1. I estimate that this year's budget will be approximately \$400,000. This is not an insignificant amount for a Temple that has approximately 240 families. We are also working on resolving Temple's URJ dues, which have gone unpaid for the past five years. Many thanks to Mort Finkelstein, who is helping us resolve that problem.

This summer, we will be making significant changes to how members make contributions. We will improve the statements that members receive. We are working on enabling members to make contributions online. We will also be improving transparency by communicating to members, usually with each statement, how the Temple is doing financially.

While we have some challenges to deal with, the Board is committed to leading a vibrant Jewish community in Grand Rapids. ✨

Thoughts from the Rabbi

Rabbi Michael Schadick

Rabbi Schadick is completing the last 8 weeks of his sabbatical this summer. These are the words he shared with Noah Spungen and Thomas Turrentine on Friday, May 20. This was the occasion of their Confirmation.

The students of the famous Rabbi Levi Yitzchak of Berditchev came to their teacher with this question. Why does every tractate of the Talmud begin on the second page? He replied, "However much we learn, we should always remember that we have not even reached the first page."

Jewish knowledge is supposed to be a lifelong pursuit, a journey that we take not simply to acquire more information, but a journey that we take to grow who we are as human beings, to improve the very essence of who we are.

I hope that in the years you have been coming here to Sunday school our teachers have imparted this wisdom to you in their own way, that whatever their subject matter was, whatever their course hoped to cover, it was only the very tip of what the subject was, a chance to whet the appetite for more knowledge. I think we sometimes forget what a treasure trove of wisdom our faith has at its very core. And this treasure trove is always yours for the taking, whether today or tomorrow, or at any time in your lives.

Shira reminds me each week how challenging it is to get up for Sunday school each week. She tells

me in no uncertain terms about all the homework she has and all things she has to get done. And so tonight I applaud your commitment to coming getting up on Sunday mornings and coming for class, knowing full well that there were other things that you very well could have been doing during this time. The rite of Confirmation is simply a moment in your teenage lives, to say in your own way, I confirm who I am as a Jew. I am proud of my heritage. I am proud of my people. And I am proud to announce that I will continue to live by the tenets of this faith for all of my days. And we, this rabbi, your parents and your grandparents, and your extended families are very proud of this commitment that you are making here tonight.

You both are quite blessed young men. Each of you has parents and grandparents that love you dearly, in ways that I cannot begin to express in words. They are also wonderful role models for how it is to live life. Your families are generous. Your families are involved, not only in the life of this synagogue, but also in the life of this community in which we live.

I know it is quite trite to say this, but I must. "Where have the years gone?" We have watched you grow and mature and become fine young men. And for that we do indeed give thanks this night.

What we wish for you tonight is a lifetime of blessings, love and joy, peace and contentment, strength and courage, and fulfillment in whatever avenues you choose to pursue. And as your rabbi, I hope that your faith will play an important role in your life, guiding you and instructing you and assisting you as you journey on the path ahead.

Our ancestors journeyed from Egypt to Sinai during these weeks in history, from Passover to Shavuot. What they came to accept at the foot of that mountain, was accepted for all future Jews. Thank you both for continuing on this chain of transmission, for accepting this sacred responsibility, the faith of our people, Jewish life, and may you insure that it is indeed passed to the next generation.

I hope that and pray that you will never forget the importance of your link to our chain.
